After these dates, applications will be considered on a space-available basis.

We encourage you to complete the application early in the filing period. By completing the application early, you have time to request and ensure the arrival of your transcripts to the University of Illinois.

If you are applying as an incoming sophomore transfer for Fall 2010 admission, we strongly recommend applying after the completion of your Fall 2009 courses.

ADMISSION NOTIFICATION

If you apply for Spring 2010 entry, you will be notified of a decision by mid-December 2009. If you apply for Fall 2010 entry, you will be notified of a decision by mid-April 2010.

APPLICATION TIPS

You're probably wondering what we consider while reviewing an application. We place special emphasis upon your courses taken in college, grades, and application essays; but we also pay attention to non-academic aspects of your life, such as extracurricular activities, work and volunteer experience, and honors and awards received. Test scores and class rank from high school may be considered for students who will not be transferring with junior status. We try to look at the complete picture of who you are and how you will contribute to the talented, bright, and diverse student body at Illinois.

Following is a checklist to help guide you through the application process. You'll also find some helpful tips on how to fill out the form, as well as directions for parts of the application that may not be self-explanatory. Go ahead and check off the steps as you complete them; we don't want you to overlook an important aspect of the application. As an applicant, it is your responsibility to know the application requirements and to submit the necessary materials.

ALL APPLICANTS

□ There are two ways to apply:

1. Apply online at www.apply.illinois.edu. We encourage online applications because it saves time and paper. When you apply online you create an ID and PIN, which enables you to check your application status after submitting your application.

□ **Before you begin.** Take time to review the application and prepare the content you plan to provide. After writing and organizing your information, including essays and activities, it should take approximately 30 minutes to complete the application.

□ **Essays.** Two essays (see questions #31 and #32 for topics) of no more than 300 words each are required in the application. The essay portion is an important factor in our evaluation so you should allow enough time and prepare an outline of what you want to say. We want to read about you, what interests you and why. After the essays are completed, you should ask a teacher or counselor to proofread and provide feedback. Remember, they should not write for you, but help catch misspellings and give suggestions.

□ **Activities, Work Experience, Community Service, and Honors/Awards.** List the most important and meaningful experiences you've had and honors earned during college for each question.

□ **Pick a major.** You can browse our list of majors and concentrations online at www.admissions.illinois.edu. Research the particular program you're interested in and try to describe your interest or experience in that subject when writing the application essays.

- » On the application, you may only apply to one program; however, you will automatically be considered for other related majors, including your second choice, if you are not selected for admission to your first choice.
- » If you are interested in pursuing a career in law, medicine, nursing, or secondary education, indicate this goal on question #26.
- » Not all programs accept applications for the spring term. Visit our Web site to determine which programs are open before applying for Spring 2010 admission.

□ **Need-Based Aid.** For consideration of need-based aid, the Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA) must be completed. Students applying for Spring '10 admission need to complete the 2009-2010 FAFSA and those applying for Fall '10 admission must complete the 2010-2011 FAFSA. You can find the FAFSA form at www.fafsa.ed.gov, or at college or university financial aid offices. The Federal School Code for Illinois is 001775.

□ **Read all instructions before starting.** We don't want you to overlook a vital portion of a question.

□ **Give accurate information.** Try to give a true picture of who you are, where your interests lie, and what your academic goals include. We will learn a lot about you if you take the time to tell us who you are: aspirations, successes, and challenges you're facing.

□ **Proofread.** Admission is competitive, and mistakes and omissions can hurt your chances.

□ **Double-check your e-mail address.** We send important information via e-mail. Please submit an address that will be checked frequently and notify the Office of Undergraduate Admissions if you change it.

□ **Application Fee.** Please submit a nonrefundable \$40 application fee (\$50 for international applicants), payable to the University of Illinois, or a completed fee waiver from your financial aid office. If you are a student at the University of Illinois at Chicago or the University of Illinois at Springfield, you do not need to submit an application fee.

□ **Submit your completed application.** This can be done online or via paper application, which needs to be signed, dated, and all accompanying materials included.

□ **Submit your transcripts.** We need official transcripts from each postsecondary institution you previously attended, in addition to an official final transcript from your high school. Please request that official transcripts be sent from your secondary and postsecondary institution directly to the Office of Undergraduate Admissions when you apply. Your high school transcript is required to confirm graduation. If you received a GED certificate, you need to submit the GED results.

□ **Submit your test scores.** It's required that you send us a standardized test score if you have less than 30 graded transferable semester hours of college coursework at the time of application: ACT (code 1154) or SAT 1 (code 1836) scores are accepted. The writing component of the ACT is required if you graduated high school in 2008 or later.

□ **Check the status of your application.** Once you receive acknowledgement of receipt from us, you may check the status of your application through our Web site: www.admissions.illinois.edu. AVIATION (PILOTS)

An FAA medical examination is required before beginning of class. Color vision must be normal, and vision must be 20/20 or correctable to 20/20.

TEACHER EDUCATION APPLICANTS

Applicants to all education curricula are required to pass the Illinois Certification Testing System Basic Skills test. Scores must be reported to the Council on Teacher Education (www.cote.illinois.edu) by the time of application. For more information, visit www.icts.nesinc.com. Students entering pre-teacher education (sophomore transfers only) do not need to have taken the Basic Skills test at the time of application.

Students applying to the majors of elementary, early childhood, or special education as well as students applying to the secondary school teaching minor must provide the College of Education evidence of formal experience (minimum of 50 hours) working with children or youth comparable to the age-level of students served in the program for which application is made. OTHER INFORMATION

SOCIAL SECURITY NUMBER DISCLOSURE

Your Social Security Number (SSN) is requested pursuant to Public Law 93-579 for the University's system of student records, as well as for compliance with federal and state reporting requirements. An SSN is required if you are applying for financial aid but is not required for admission to the University. Providing an SSN will, however, speed up the processing of your application since we will not need to manually match your application with other materials such as transcripts and test scores. Supplying an SSN ensures that you will be able to claim the Hope Tax Credit, if you are eligible, on your federal tax return. The University has a strong commitment to ensuring the privacy and confidentiality of student records and will not disclose your SSN without your consent for any purpose except as allowed by law.

AGE AND HIGH SCHOOL GRADUATION REQUIREMENTS
